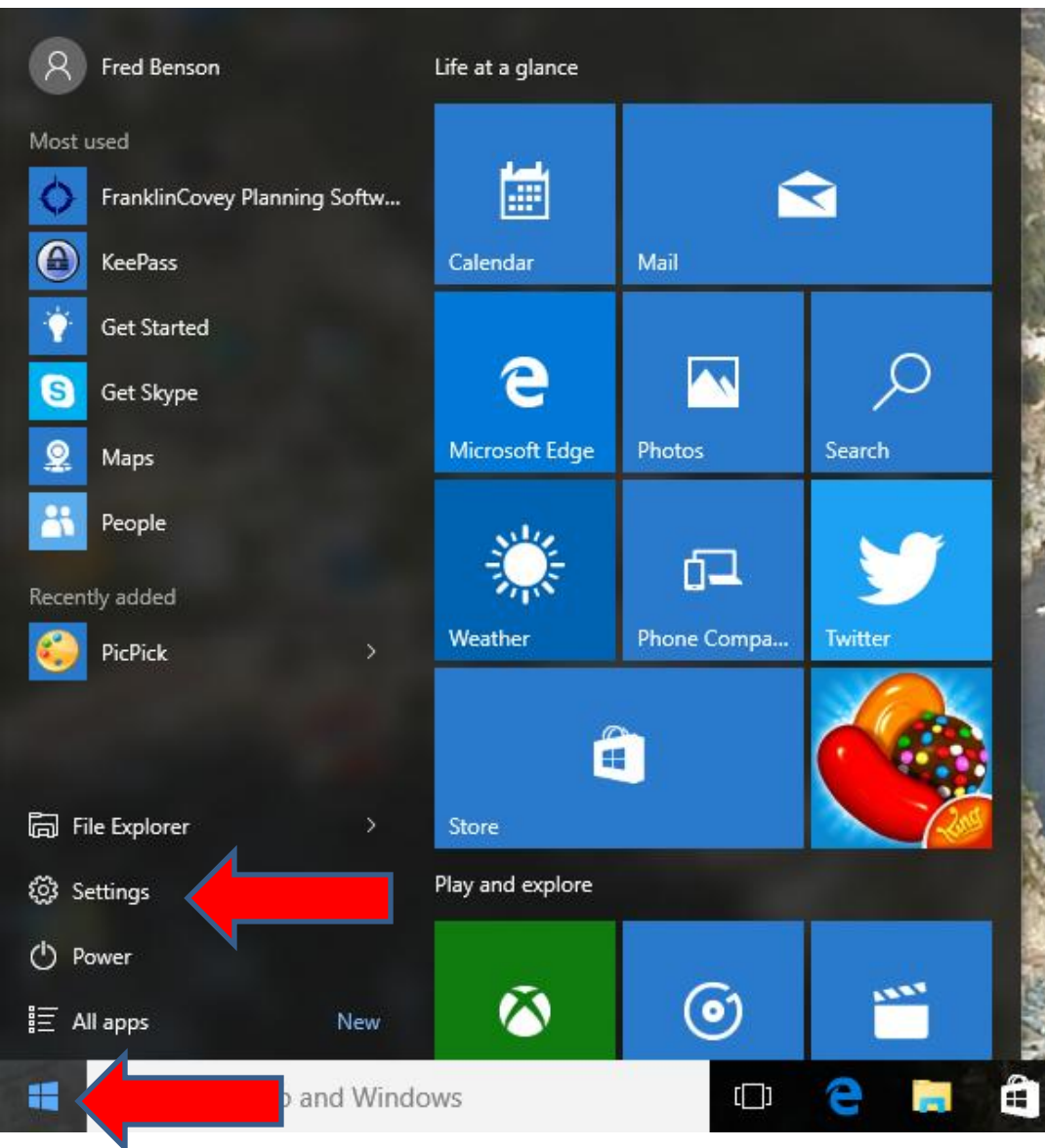


How to add a Picture to your Account in Windows 10?

- **If you have a picture on your account in Windows 7 and you upgrade to Windows 10 the picture is no longer there.**
- **If you have a Picture on your account in Windows 8.1 and you upgrade to Windows 10, sometimes the picture stays and not removed.**
- **Next is a sample of starting Windows 10 without a picture.**

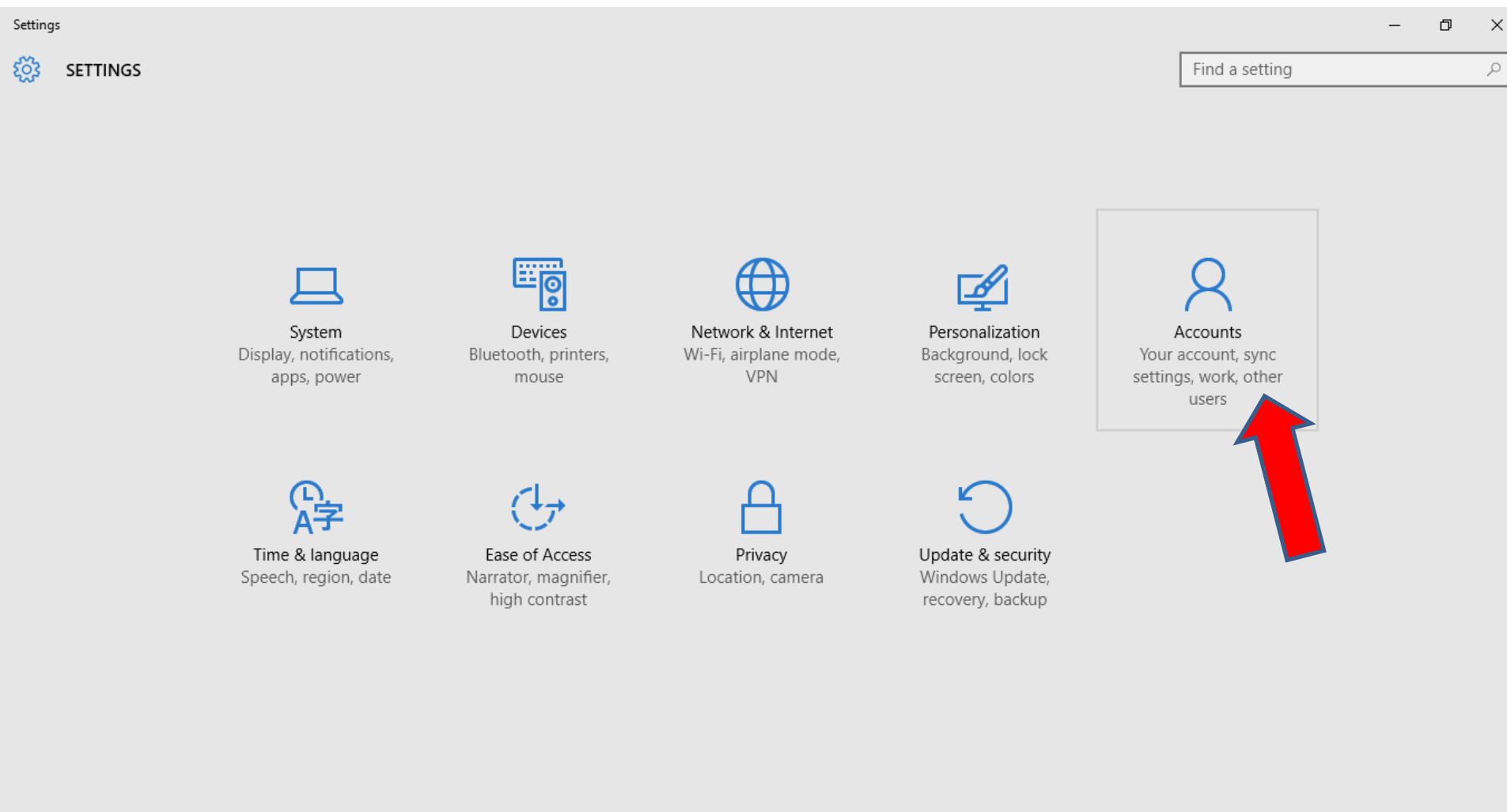
**You see your name, but not a Picture.
Next, is how to add a Picture.**






- **Once you log-in, click on the start menu and then click on settings.**

A new window opens and click on Accounts.



It changes to this Window. Then Click on Browse to find your picture.

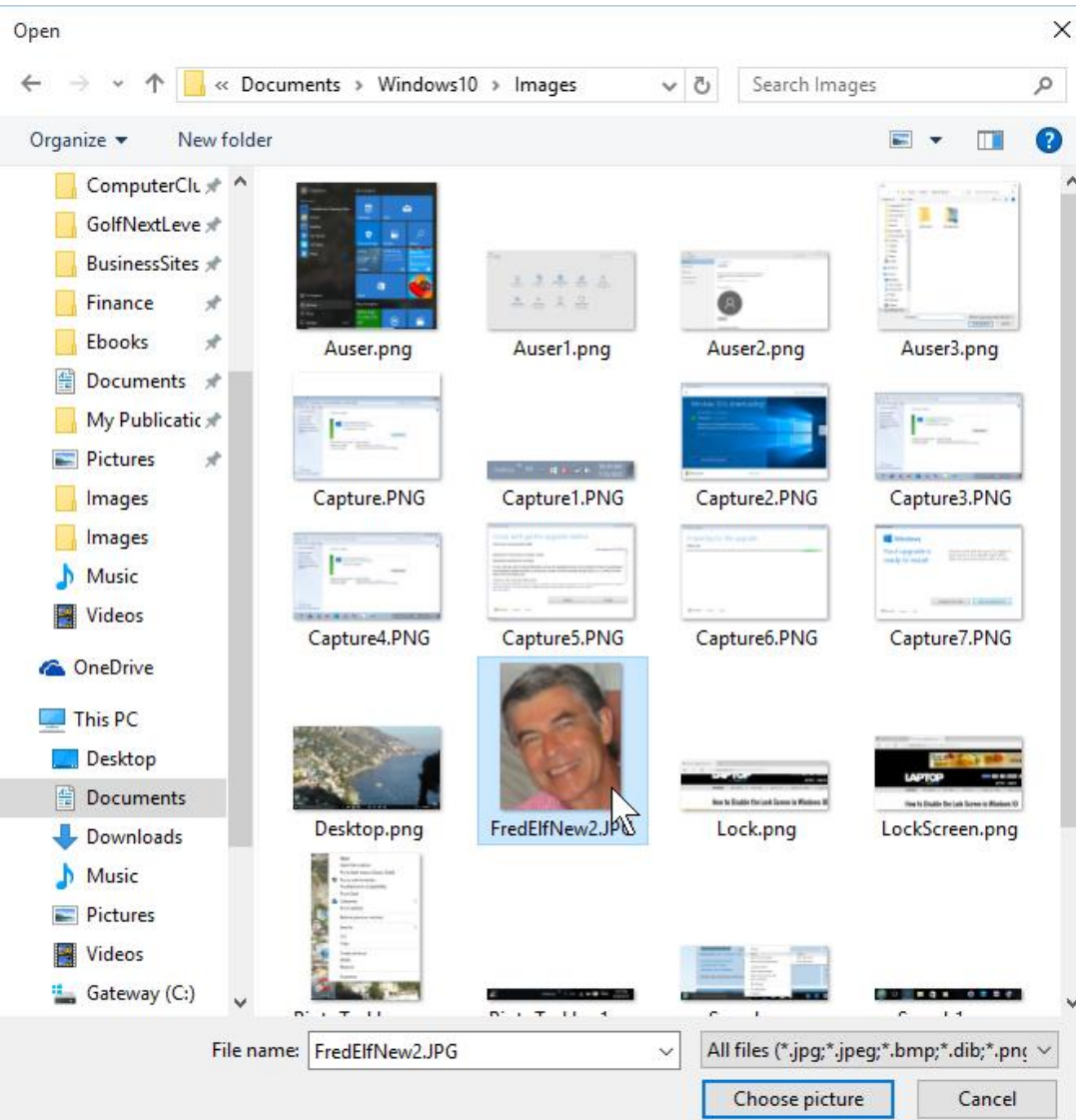


